INSURANCE REP REPORT

Caring for Our Own

The Knights of Columbus isn't just an insurance company. It's a brotherhood, and so we do things differently.

If we were just another insurance company, you'd be nothing more than customers – or potential customers – who only add value based on the products you purchase. But you're not. You're brothers, and so are we. After all, Father McGivney founded the Knights 132 years ago so that we could help each other. So we offer you products and services unique to our industry because we care deeply about you and your families, and your wellbeing.

For starters, we extend to each of our members an Accidental Death benefit for free, just by virtue of their membership in the Knights of Columbus.

The program – which is only available in insurance jurisdictions – provides a benefit of \$1,000 - \$2,500 upon the accidental death of any member or his spouse (subject to certain age restrictions).

The program was launched at the 113th Supreme Council Meeting in 1994, and has continued to the present day, providing more than \$12.5 million in benefits.

In addition to the Accidental Death benefit, the Knights of Columbus offer a number of free services to our members and their families.

First and foremost, we agents are committed to providing survivor assistance to widows and families left behind after the loss of a loved one.

Most commercial agents would fill out the necessary paperwork and move on, but not Knights of Columbus agents. We will stand by you and help you contact your attorney to sort out the will, help you make funeral arrangements, help you notify and coordinate with the council, help resolve any financial matters, help you file *any* claims (including claims with companies other than the Knights of Columbus), and will help file for survivor benefits or Veteran's benefits, if necessary.

Secondarily, we offer two additional services to help Knights' families plan. The first is Profiles & Forecaster, a comprehensive and complimentary industry tool that helps you evaluate your family's financial situation, and to determine what insurance protection – if any – may be needed. The second, the Knights of Columbus Personal Planning Workbook, will help you record your final wishes and important information (including accounts, passwords, funeral arrangements, etc.) for your survivors. Both of these services are free.

To our insurance members,* we offer two additional programs: the Family Fraternal Benefit Program, and the Orphan Fraternal Benefit Program.

The Family Fraternal Benefit Program offers two distinct benefits. The first offers insurance eligibility to uninsurable children. Through the Program, a member can purchase a \$5,000 life insurance policy for an otherwise uninsurable child at *standard* rates before the child is 61 days old, or at a rated premium if before the child's 18th birthday. A member can also purchase a \$5,000 policy for a mentally impaired child at standard rates, between the ages of 3 and 18 years old.

The Program also offers death benefit coverage to members who have lost an infant child less than 61 days after birth, or who have lost an unborn child in a stillbirth, after the 20th week. (The Order affirms that life begins at conception. In this instance, the benefit requires a certified death certificate for the stillborn child, hence the 20-week rule.)

The second fraternal benefit program available to insured members is the Orphan Fraternal Benefit Program. This extensive program also provides two benefits. The first is an \$80 monthly benefit for each eligible orphan, until their 19th birthday. The second is a scholarship program, which grants eligible orphans up to \$1,750 per year for a four-year period.

In a letter addressing the programs, our Supreme Knight Carl Anderson noted that “These benefits augment the tradition of fraternity established by Father McGivney, namely, that *the Order cares for its own*; it expands upon a basic reason for which he founded the Order: ‘of rendering pecuniary aid to its members, their families, and beneficiaries of members and their families.’”

They are part of what makes us unique.

So get to know all of our fraternal benefits, and the ways in which you may benefit from them.

**To be eligible for both the Family Fraternal Benefit Program, and the Orphan Fraternal Benefit Program, the member must be in good standing, and either he or his wife must be insured under a Knights of Columbus certificate requiring an annual premium of at least \$150, or providing at least \$5,000 in permanent life insurance coverage. Eligibility for the Orphan Fraternal Benefit Program is also contingent on the child being covered by an individual Knights of Columbus certificate.*

Last year the council purchased a table for eight and the past grand knight, Peter Nolan, myself, father Hernando, and father Cantwell attended. We will be discussing this at the April 9 meeting since reservation checks have to be sent by May 10

A MAN FOR OTHERS

As we come to the end of our Lenten journey, preparing to celebrate the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus Christ, we can reflect on the great love He has for us. We must continue fighting to eliminate any and all violations against human dignity, whether in the legalized murder of the unborn, "euthanasia" against the infirm or elderly, or mistreatment of the poor, the vulnerable, those on the fringes of society. Each of us is called to educate others by our witness to truth and love.

As always, prayer is essential. Together with prayer, we must study and know our faith—and live it out in concrete actions, both large and small. It's part of that great Catholic principle of both / and. Prayer and work. Spiritual and Corporal works of mercy, etc. To that end, I offer a couple of seemingly small efforts that might make a significant mark. Ask that person their name, ask if you can pray for them, and specifically what you can pray about. These seemingly small actions may make a tremendous impact in the souls of those we interact with.

We must continue both the larger efforts at turning around unjust laws AND the "smaller" deeds of personally witnessing in love toward individuals, one-on-one.

Each of us is called to be a witness of Christ—and a man for others.

Admiral's Corner

My Brothers, Easter is almost upon us and as I was in church saying my prayers' and looking up at the alter, I focused my attention on the cross as I normally do. I know that our lord suffered a lot the day he died, however, I never really thought about it, I guess I just took it for granted. I decided to look into his final day and this is what I found.

Crucifixion was the "worst" death and only the very worst were condemned to that. Pryor to his crucifixion he was beaten to with in an inch of his life. He then was given a cross to carry that weighed close to 100 pounds and forced to carry it almost two miles, not on a paved flat road but over rocks and uphill. Do not forget the crown of thorns that cut into his scalp so deep that his face was covered in blood. The nails that were used, according to the information I was able to find, were Six to Eight Inches long. They were not driven into his hands as many pictures depict but through his wrist. It is hard to imagine the damage that caused to the Tendons, Blood Vessels and Bones. The same went for his feet. How he endured this for over Three Hours is more than I can conceive.

The human adult body contains (in most people) a little less than a gallon of blood. Our Lord was bleeding most of the day and very heavy the final three hours, so when the Roman Guard pierced his side with a spear, it was no wonder that the only thing that came out was water. Jesus had no more blood to give.

My Brothers we should all remember what Our Lord went through so our sins would be washed away. The next time you hit your knees and look up at our Lord on the cross, please keep this information in mind, I know I will. Happy Easter

FROM THE DESK OF YOUR DISTRICT DEPUTY



My Brothers,

The following was gathered from personal research into 1966 newspapers off microfiche.

In November 18, 1966 newspapers across the United States published the story that the 1100-year-old enforced discipline of avoiding meat on every Friday has died for American Catholics. But in dropping the mandatory ban the national conference of Catholic bishops expressed the hope that “the Catholic community will ordinarily continue to abstain from meat by free choice as formerly we did in obedience to the church law.”

The obligation on Catholics to fast as well as abstain from meat “is particularly binding on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday as well as Fridays during Lent.” The new practices went into effect on the first Sunday of Advent, the beginning of the Christian liturgical year,

The bishops declared explicitly that their decision did not reduce the significance of Fridays which to Christians mark as a weekly remembrance of the crucifixion. They suggested choosing other forms of self-disciplines. The bishops went on to say “Even though we hereby terminate the traditional law of abstinence binding under the pain of sin, as the sole prescribed means of observing Friday, we give first place to abstinence from flesh meat. We do so in the hope that the Catholic community will ordinarily continue to abstain from meat by free choice as we did in obedience to church law.”

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As we enter the month of April the season of Triduum is upon us. This is the period of three days on the church calendar that begins with the liturgy on the evening of Maundy Thursday (The vigil of Good Friday) and ends with evening prayer on Easter Sunday.

It marks the end of the forty days of Lent and the beginning of the three-day celebration of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ - Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday. The Fathers of the Second Vatican Council reminded us of the extraordinary significance of the *Triduum* : "Christ redeemed us all and gave perfect glory to God principally through his paschal mystery: dying he destroyed our death and rising he restored our life. Therefore the Easter *Triduum* of the passion and resurrection of Christ is the culmination of the entire liturgical year.

We are an Easter People, let us all gather as one community in Christ in prayer and celebration for he died for us and was risen from the dead so that our sins may be forgiven.

Karen, Tiffany and I wish each of you a joyous Easter with your families in prayer and thanksgiving.
